The donations from the Class of 1960 and its members follow on the heels of





Review of 2010 Activities

The L-P School Foundation (LPSF) was involved in three major activities and events during 2010 – coordinating the annual Senior Project, reaching out to alumni, and making a grant to the L-P Schools.

The first major activity undertaken by the L-P School Foundation was the Class of 2010 Senior Project. Initially organized by the Class of 2000, this was the 11th consecutive year of holding a Senior Project.

The Class of 2010 project was a

basketball benefit, held at the LHS gymnasium, and attended by an estimated 350-400 fans. That evening \$2,252 was raised for the L-P School Foundation, and three very large boxes of food were collected for the Helping Hand food pantry. Additional monetary donations received since then have increased the total amount raised by the Class of 2010 to \$4,102.

The basketball benefit consisted of four games, each lasting 20 minutes. In the first game, the
